Education & Values

 2. Respect for all kinds of work: This can be inculcated by vocational training. Boys may be encouraged for home science. Girls may be motivated to take up robotics. This will help break gender barriers.
- Japan's school curriculum also includes



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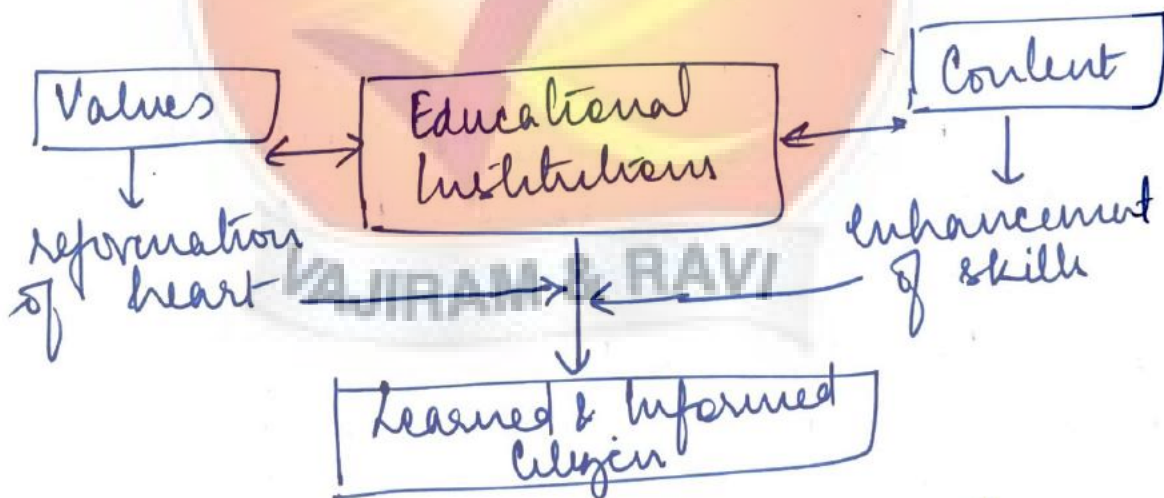
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cleaning of toilets, gardening etc.

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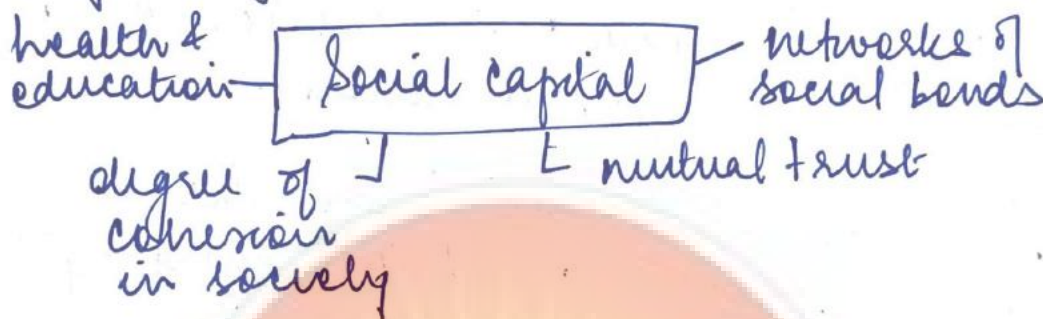

Attitude is a learned tendency to act in particular ways towards an object (belief). As a mental construct, it plays a crucial role in our social capital, both positively & negatively.



Building social capital:

Positive attitude

- Respect for all sections of society leads to inclusive growth
- Social & reformative justice for equitable growth
- Keeps realising the importance of health & education for overall development

(Q) i) Educating a mother helps in overcoming inter generational transfer of poverty due to investment in

- nutrition of children
- greater say in decision making (overcoming gender barriers)
- malnourished & anaemic population (as per NFHS-5)

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(ii) Positive attitude of a bureaucrat helps in effective implementation of social welfare schemes (eg Armstrong Parne's initiative in Manipal).

Attitude not enough:-

Social capital can be developed with the support of other crucial factors like:

- Integrity of individuals
- Transparency & accountability of administration (eg TN Seshan's role in cleansing electoral malpractices)
- Strong will power & commitment (eg Karlish Salyartri's efforts towards child labour victims)

Sanctions, positive attitude may be met with institutional barriers of corruption, red tapism etc (eg Satyendra Dubey's case).

Likewise, negative attitude can lead to declining moral fabric & slippery slope (eg Osama bin Laden's resolve to avenge resulted in 9/11 attacks).

Therefore, attitude with right intentions, values & support of social institutions will lead to effective social capital formation in a sustainable manner.

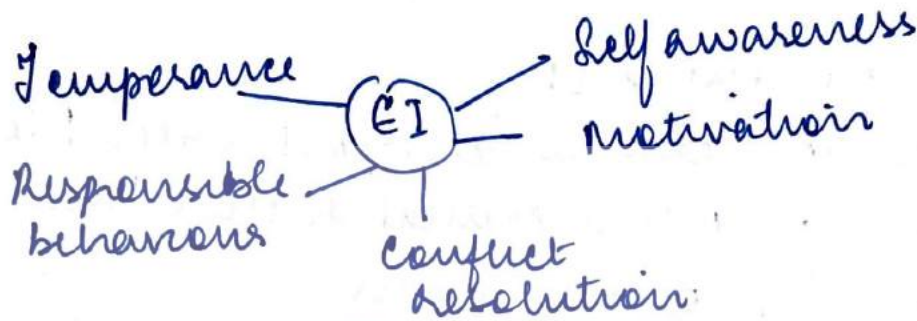
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2 a) Emotional Intelligence (EI) is the ability to recognise & manage one's emotions as well as that of others:



In today's globalised world, the ^{workplace} arena presents multiple challenges due to diversity in employees, job (work) expectations, personal stress, external forces of recession etc. It is here that EI helps us navigate effectively.

workplace conflict	Use of EI
1) Boss expects overtime to finish deadlines, but team is not willing to cooperate	→ Use of effective communication to boost the morale of team (a) Giving breaks, taking them out for lunches / dinners.

Suspicion on a man's character, who is being mentally harassed:

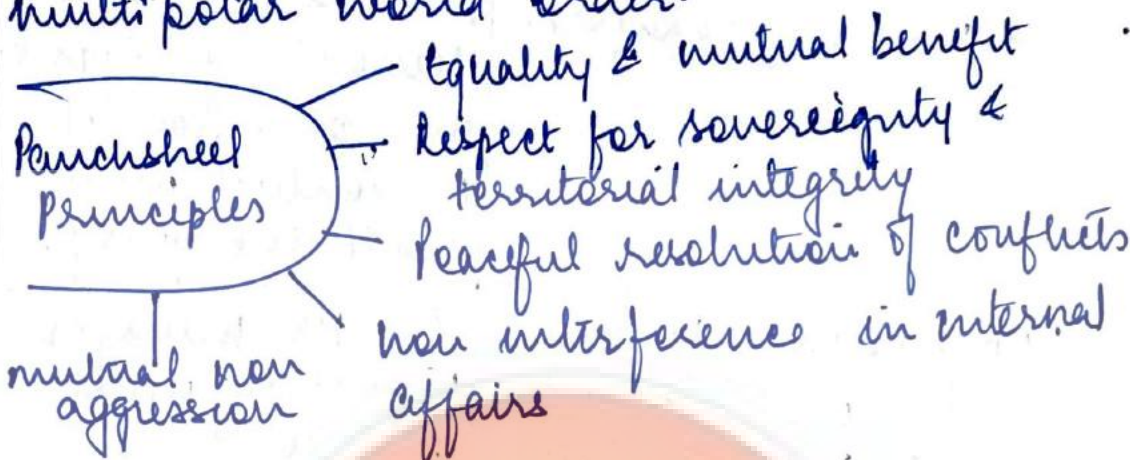
attitude towards him, speak to them personally & offer counselling support. Any allegation of misconduct must result in enquiry.

③ Workers in a factory have gone on strike due to fears of mass lay offs owing to AI, IR4.0 etc.

The HR manager of factory must address their concerns & speak to leader of trade union to win his/her support thereby resolving trust deficit.

Therefore, tools of EI can be used to resolve workplace conflicts. Moreover, on a personal level, EI helps to achieve work life balance, manage stressful situations with confidence and hence lead by example. In this way, EI goes a long way in ensuring a good work culture, conducive to personal & professional growth.

(b) The Panchsheel doctrine, though formulated in the 1960s, stands relevant, even today, given the challenges of a multipolar world order.



Bilateral Conflicts & Mutual Suspicion:

The world today is facing challenges of a trust deficit among nations. This manifests as:

- (i) Russia-Ukraine conflict, due to border disputes, suspicion of Ukraine joining NATO.
- (ii) Israel-Hamas war due to perceived injustice for Palestinians & suspicion of Hamas being supported by as a proxy by Iran.
- (iii) India-Pakistan conflict over J&K due to suspicion of terrorism being financed by Jihadists in Pakistan.
- (iv) US-China trade war due to suspicion of Chinese aggression in Indian Ocean.

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region & technological warfare in cyberspace.

Panchsheel to the rescue

- (i) Respecting sovereignty of countries: China's BRI passing through Pak must be avoided to bridge trust deficit.
- (ii) Mutual non aggression: Both Hamas & Israeli army can agree for a ceasefire to stop the destruction of lives & livelihoods.
- (iii) Peaceful resolution of conflicts: The Galwan clashes ~~must~~ be more de-escalated due to formal agreement over border disputes. After all, a pen is mightier than the sword.
- (iv) Non interference in internal affairs: USA's involvement in Iran, Afghanistan has led to rise of Islamic fundamentalism. This must be avoided & country's must be free to develop their own growth models, respecting human rights.
- (v) Equality & mutual benefit: India's SAARC doctrine, coupled with BRICS, SCO like groupings have helped in sustainable & inclusive growth for all.
- Therefore, Panchsheel is a timeless doctrine. Its potential must be tapped into for a just, equitable & fair global order.

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(3) (a) 'Give a man a fish, and you feed him for a day;
Teach him how to fish, and you feed him for a lifetime'.

The above quote stands relevant in the era of growing freebies culture as a populist measure to win elections.

Ethical issues involved:

① Creates a culture of dependency among the beneficiaries. This results in

→ poor skill enhancement
→ perpetuating vicious cycle of poverty (since freebie amount is insufficient for investment in healthcare, education etc).

② Ignores principle role as a stakeholder in development:

→ poor voter awareness on the schemes' purpose
→ focus on just top down policy formulation, without a feedback loop for ground realities.

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③ Environmental ethics: Freebies of free electricity, water etc (Punjab govt) result in

- groundwater exploration & depletion
- air pollution due to thermal generation of electricity
- skewed cropping patterns (rice, sugarcane etc) → stubble burning → poor food security

Ways to resolve:

→ Bottom up approach factoring ground realities (eg) Women & Development v/s women in development for gender budgeting for schemes like Beti Bachao etc

→ focus on capacity building to as to create gainful employment opportunities (eg) Stand Up India, PMKVY etc

→ Majoritarianism & minority appeasement must give way to honest democratic elections (eg) sound policies that focus on inclusive growth ie Sabka Vikas must be made.

The best way to counter the freebies culture would be to increase voter awareness & achieve a democratic polity based on cognitive attitudes. The Golden mean of Aristotle v/s too much dependence or too little consideration must be used.

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(b) Probity in governance refers to adherence to sound principles of ethical administration i.e. accountability, integrity, transparency etc.

Probity → Socio economic Development

(a) Accountability in administration
→ being responsible for one's actions & owning upto failures if any

→ Citizens charter has helped in holding officials responsible for promises / standards expectation.

(e) Income Tax Charter has resulted in awareness & increase in ITRs filed.

(b) Integrity
→ Synchronisation in thoughts, beliefs & actions
→ Doing the right thing even when nobody is watching

→ Corruption, nepotism etc can be countered with financial integrity & propriety.

(e) GFR, 2017 in
→ awarding contracts

(e) Recusal of judges from cases with potential conflict of interest.



Transparency

- ① Clear & effective communication of information allowed to be disclosed.
- Voluntary disclosure to bridge trust deficit in administration.

→ The RTI Act has empowered the citizens with information & increased awareness about their rights & duties.

② SC/ST reservation data used to fund out representation in govt.

Real progress & Probity

Probity alone cannot guarantee progress of a nation. It can make the wheels of administration run smoothly, but real progress also needs:

→ Constitutional morality to be upheld
① Section 377 & acceptance of LGBT+

→ Ethical reformation of individuals & communities
② Piplantri village in Rajasthan plants 111 trees on birth of every girl child.

Therefore, real progress of a nation is possible when forces of equality, fraternity, love win over the evils of segregation, terrorism, dishonesty etc.

Wisdom is a cardinal virtue as per Plato. It refers to the knowledge & experience gained by way of making mistakes & learning from them over the years. (9) Our grandparents and their wisdom on life lessons.

Acceptance of truth:-

Truth is a fact that remains unchanged in all circumstances. It is objective reality in a subjective world.

(a) Wisdom helps us accept the truth, no matter how harsh it may be.

(9) Loss of a loved one usually takes us in a mode of denial, where we cannot accept their death. Wisdom helps us cope with the overwhelming emotions of sadness.

(b) Wisdom helps us deal with truth in a mature way.

(9) When a bureaucrat's integrity is questioned on allegations of misconduct, financial fraud etc, the wisdom of

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DoPT or Inquiry officials helps in reaching the truth & giving a balanced, fair verdict.

Renouncing Untruth:-

Untruth or falsehood is the opposite of objective reality. It is tainted with personal beliefs & biases. It forms based on subjective interpretation & is guided by our values.

Wisdom helps in :-

(a) Focusing on why the untruth is difficult to let go. (a) Strong conditioning since childhood indoctrinates one with caste biases. Wisdom helps one overcome the same & develop an egalitarian outlook, like Dr BR Ambedkar.

(b) Getting out of difficult circumstances, especially when untruth seems more convenient. (a) Falsehood of topping an exam by cheating v/s wisdom to accept the mistake & not repeat it in future.

Therefore, wisdom helps in an ongoing process which helps us lead a truthful life, guided by universal values & not personal biases.



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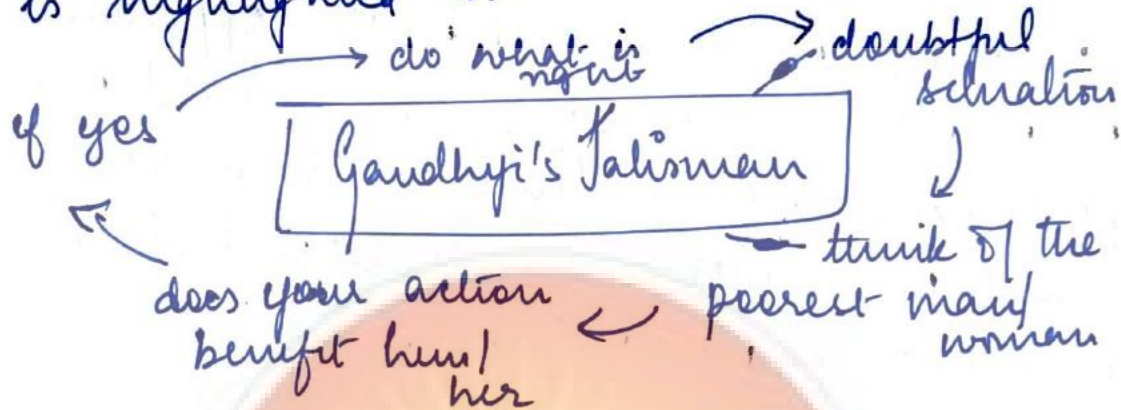

Gandhi's talisman stands as a guiding light in resolving ethical dilemmas that public officials face in everyday life. The essence of his talisman is highlighted as:



Increasing Complexity in public administration

Ethical dilemma

i) Make arrangements for rehabilitation of those displaced.

Using personal assets & time v/s ~~Assets~~ being honest & displaying integrity
→ This can be resolved by taking inspiration from honest leaders like Lal Bahadur Shastri; leading a simple life

Therefore, Gandhiji's Tolsonian helps us develop our character towards a more sympathetic, empathetic & informed citizen. It helps us imbibe values of Sarvodaya with Antyodaya, for an inclusive world.

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Education means 'to bring up'. It is a process which starts from the time we take birth and helps us develop our personality with time.

Often equated with academic brilliance, education is more than just formalised learning & schooling. The quote by Helen Keller highlights how a truly educated individual is one with values of tolerance.



This may be exemplified at various levels:

① At the global level, educated leaders must display tolerance in

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accepting CSR (common but differentiated responsibilities) towards climate change. (eg) ISA, CDRI etc.

(2) At the level of communities, tolerance may be shown by rejecting ethnocentric biases & opting an inclusive approach.

(eg) Acceptance & love shown towards LGBTQ+ , (eg) Khap Panchayats protecting inter faith couples etc.

(3) At the level of individual, tolerance may be displayed by our everyday interaction with those less privileged or those with differences from us (eg) Using emotional intelligence to resolve workplace conflicts.

(eg) Accepting constructive criticism from our seniors / juniors etc.

Therefore, education is meaningful only when it makes us tolerant to others' beliefs, values & opinions. This helps us make the world a rainbow, and not a black & white reality of only our understanding of the world.

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(b) Service to self, is service to God. This motto has been the guiding principle that has shaped humanity over generations. To serve, is to some of help to somebody in need. (e) Offering blanket to a beggar on a chilly winter

Revered without joy

Joy or happiness would result in unconditional service. We would not be expecting anything in return.

The served or the beneficiary of our action, would feel loved & cared for, if our deeds are guided by joy. Otherwise, it just seems like charity and ~~the~~ the person may not like the pity.

(e) Giving water to your househelp during summers, not because you don't want her to fall sick & take a day off, but because you genuinely care for her health.

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The servant or the person offering to help must not be guided by ethical egoism. (Ayn Rand). This attitude of a benefactor would make the entire service meaningless, since we would be selfishly serving others so as to gain publicity, feel better about ourselves etc.

(eg) Giving money to a beggar in front of others so that they may think of you as kind & sympathetic.

Therefore, real service is one which stems straight from the heart, and makes us happy while doing it. The joy so derived itself becomes the reward. The smile on the served's face, coupled with the joy & pure intentions of the servant is what Gandhiji dreamt of, in his Sarvodaya with Antyodal model of growth.



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c)

Faith is the strong belief in something. It is our unwavering & solid understanding of something. (Q) Personal, faith in God.

FAITH + STRENGTH = GREAT WORK

Strength, both physical & mental, are crucial in shaping our faith. It helps us be more confident in our beliefs. (Q) Mental strength of faith in our abilities to clear UPSC, helps us work hard towards the goal.

Similarly, physical strength combined in faith of love for motherland results in patriotic soldiers fighting for their country.

FAITH - STRENGTH

Blind faith in some idea may result in passive attitude or inaction. (Q) just praying to God to help us top an examination, may not be fruitful.

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However, sometimes strength can manifest as evil consequences.

eg Rise of ISIS due to strong faith in jihad, combined with physical strength of arms & weapons and mental strength of ideological conditioning.

Therefore, a balanced approach of faith & strength is needed to achieve our goals. eg Sardar Patel's faith in a unified India, coupled with use of strength, when needed, resulted in ~~Operation Polo~~ ^(Hyderabad) the successful integration of princely states post independence.

Hence, faith & strength should guide us in our ethical behaviour & moral conduct, keeping virtues of goodness in mind.

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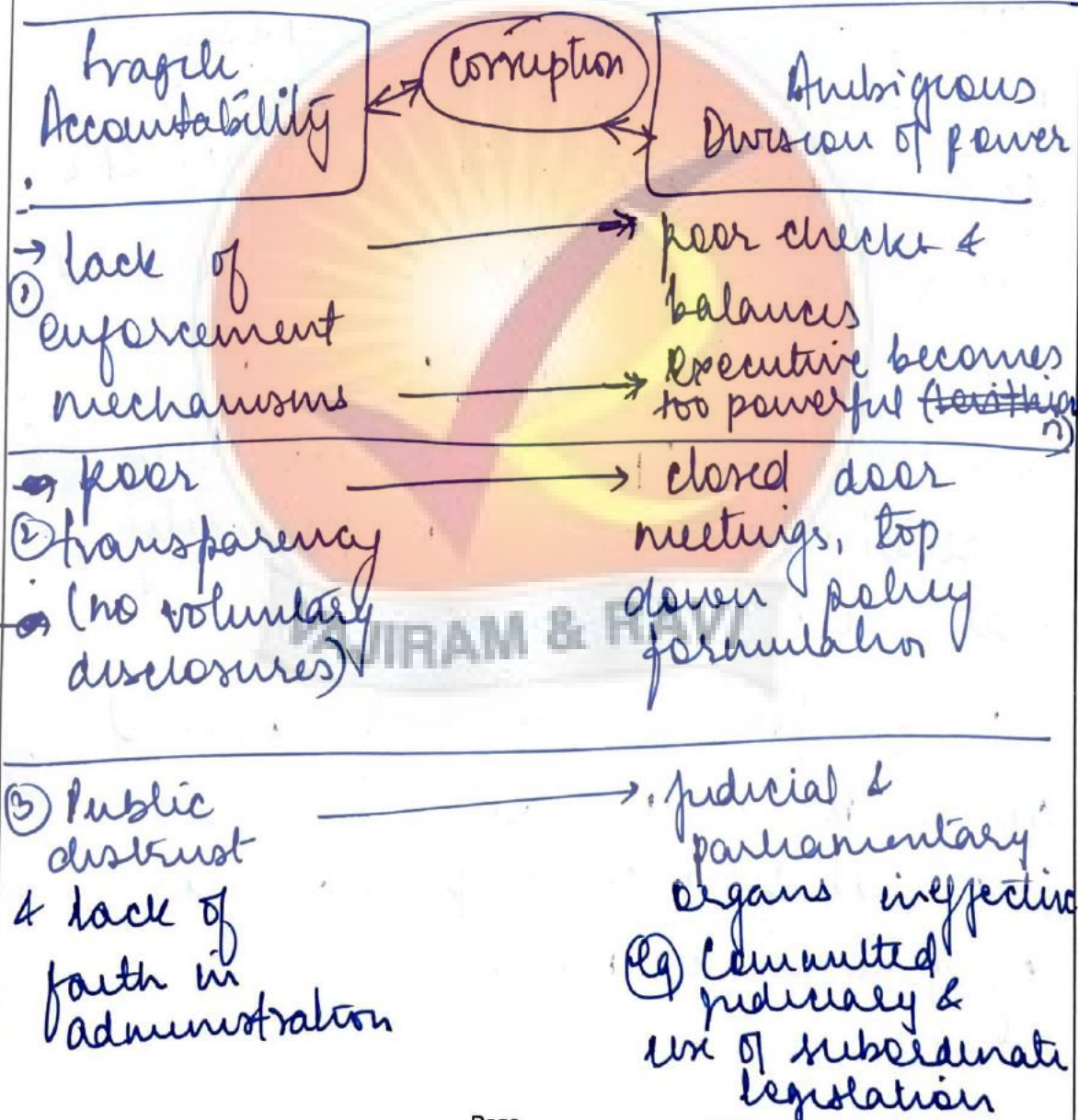
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Corruption is a slippery slope. It refers to private appropriation of public resources for personal gains. Once a person gives into corrupt practices, it is difficult to come out of it, given the accountability of public administration & division of powers.



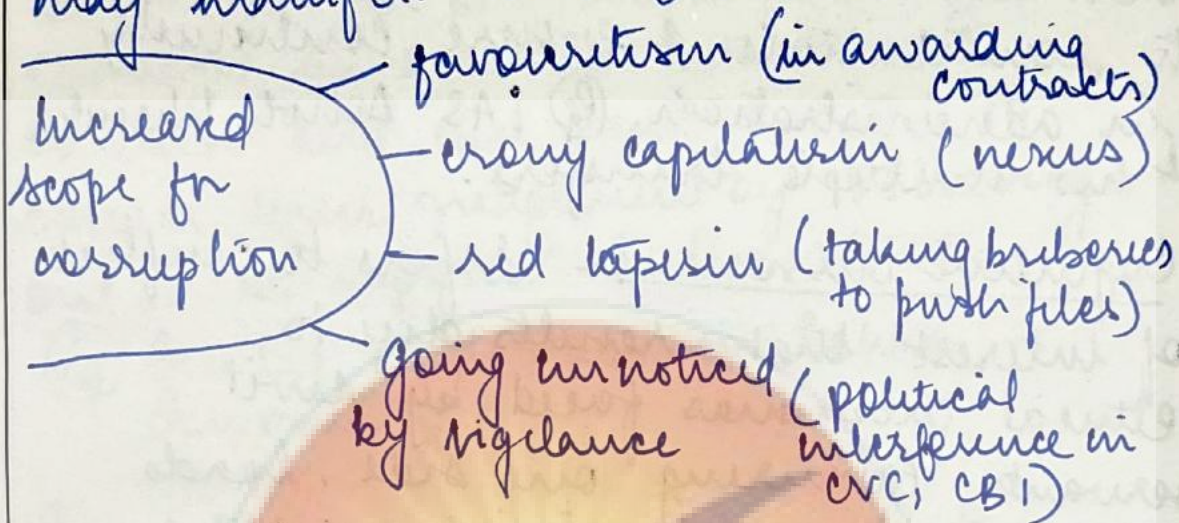
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As per Thomas Hobbes, the state may become a Leviathan (creating its own creation) when powers go unchecked. This may manifest into: ~~increased~~



Measures needed

- ① Use of technology to check malpractice
(eg) DBT, JAM Trinity, PRAAGATI portal
- ② Capacity building of civil servants
(eg) Mission Karmayogi
- ③ Constitutional morality & judicial activism (eg) 2G spectrum scam.
- ④ Encourage parliamentary debate & electing honest politicians
- ⑤ Increased awareness (eg) RTI, Citizens Charter

Therefore, corruption, as a menace, requires multi pronged effort of all organs of the government for a clean & ethical administration

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- (b)
1. Non partisanship refers to staying unbiased towards any political party & government of the day. ~~The~~ ~~the~~ Civil servants must have allegiance only to constitution & ensure continuity in administration. (Q) IAS Ashok Khemka & his multiple transfers.
 2. Cognitive dissonance refers to conflict of interest that results due to ethical dilemmas faced by civil servants. favouring one side, leads to faltering on principles of other side, this causes mental strain.
(Q) Empathy vs objectivity in denying entry into exam hall to a student late by just 20 seconds.
 3. Veil of Ignorance: John Rawls suggests that for a distributive justice to happen, everyone must imagine a veil (covers) of ignorance of not knowing if something is to benefit them or others. This helps in achieving social justice & egalitarian order
(Q) Schemes for vulnerable sections to build capacity & overcome poverty

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4. Moral relativism refers to adopting a pluralistic outlook & tolerance towards prevalent morals in society. What may be moral in one society, may be immoral in another. Both must co-exist and one must not try to colour their judgement by believing one to be superior to the other.
- (eg) Genital mutilation in Bohra community.

5. Social Influence: This refers to the power to guide behaviour & shape attitudes of a larger group. It may be enjoyed by a political leader, a celebrity etc to orient or persuade the followers towards a cause, who have blind faith in the charisma of the leader.
- (eg) Social influence of Anantaji Bachchan for the 'Do Band' campaign against Polio.

The 'Nasha Mukta Bharat' Abhiyaan to prevent drug abuse in India has resulted in increased awareness on the issue. The future of children, who get involved in this in their formative ages, rests in the hands of responsible teachers & parents.

a) The above case presents the following ethical dilemmas.

1) Reporting to authorities or staying quiet: Dr. Sanand and his son will have to bear dire consequences of any action taken by them.

2) Breaching moral fabric of society: Drug cartels operating in school & being supported by parents with their knowledge (Aditya's father)

3) Safety of other students at school is compromised. Parents would be scared to send their children.

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4) Teachers' reformative role? The learning outcomes of students will decline, furthering impacting the future social capital of society.

5) Professional obligation v/s personal conscience.

Dr Anand will face cognitive dissonance if he does not report it. However, he also has to think of his own child's future.

(b) Options available to Dr Anand:

① Leave the matter & take no action:

Merits: — Future of his child is secured

His professional prospects & promotions are not threatened

Demerits — Irresponsible attitude towards future of other children
| selfishly following personal prospects

may face cognitive dissonance

② Report the matter immediately
Merit — Standing up for the right thing

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- as a teacher, leading by example
- shaping children's futures by saving them from drug addiction.

Demerits

- His own son may face wrath/blackmails or threats
- He may loose his job at the college.

(3) Report the matter with findings of the investigation & proof gathered from hostel rooms.

→ Ask for a counselling session with such students & their parents.

→ Give a second chance to Aditya & his father to come clean and not repeat the same in future.

→ If the pattern continues, ask for a proper criminal investigation on the case.

Merits:

Dr Sarand's credibility as a

- teacher stands secured
- No ~~ethical~~ crisis of conscience
- Reformatory justice. (by a second chance)
- Earn respect of self & others

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Demerits → His job may be taken away
→ Mere counselling won't guarantee elimination of drug abuse
→ The college's reputation may get tarnished.

Dr. Anand Anand must adopt Option 3 as its merits outweigh the demerits. He has to display accountability to self and to others in the college & this would be the most balanced approach.

→ PMLA Act (organised crime)

Therefore, Dr. Anand must take recourse to legal measures, if his social influence & persuasion fails to reform the students. The parents must also give a conducive atmosphere at home for an ethical upbringing.

The above case involves environmental ethics, coupled with a critical aspect of separating personal lives with public obligations, often faced by many civil servants.

a) Main ethical issues involved are:

(i) Ecology v/s Economy: Awarding contracts to inefficient companies resulting in degradation & rise in pollution levels.

(ii) Corruption by predecessors & seniors in accepting the terms of the contract

(iii) As the CEO, it is my responsibility & duty to improve the ranking & ensure sustainable transformation of the city.

(iv) Empathy towards friend v/s Honesty towards profession (in reporting him)

further, as a long term measure I will take following actions:

- ① Order an enquiry and conduct an EIA of the waste management company.

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② Disburse some funds from the corpus of Smart-Cities Mission to a trust (public) established for training youth in waste management practices.

③ Once the findings of the Enquiry committee come, I will give my friend a time-bound resolution to adhere to the norms and will extend the contract only based on results. He will also be able to recruit managers from the trust fund so created.

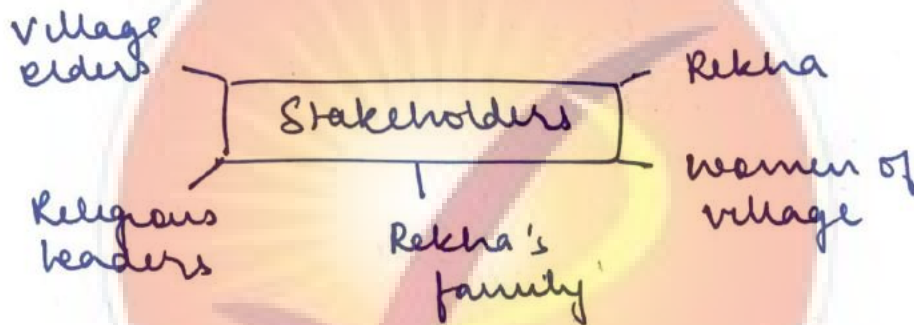

Inf points that increasing women participation may enhance India's GDP by 27%. However, like Rekha, there are many women who may not be able to contribute to this growth, owing to the institutionalisation & internalisation of patriarchy.



(a) Ethical issues involved are:

1. Barriers to women leadership due to deep rooted patriarchy
2. Education & modernisation v/s respecting age old customs
3. Lack of support from women only, shows patriarchal bargain.

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4. Social boycott as a form of punishment to deter any change.
5. Impediments to social capital like child marriage, high nirk etc.
6. Poor literacy & awareness levels in the backward district.
7. Social influence of religious leaders being used to propagate conservatism.

(b) Various options available to Rekha:

Option 1: Quit / Resign as the Sarpanch

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c) Option 3: Rekha should carry on the reforms, but with the guidance of others. She should request for proper & detailed reports / statistics on the poor demographics of the village. Also, she should discuss the stories of such successful campaigns in other villages, which have progressed by following these reforms. Rekha may request few such leaders like Ms. Chhai Rajawat to come and inspire others in Bhavanipuram.

Moreover, she should first approach the women and reach out to them using Emotional Intelligence tools of effective communication, empathy, compassion etc. She can give her own example of how focus on education & not early marriage has made her independent - both financially and otherwise. Then, she should use awareness generation tools like movies, social media campaigns etc

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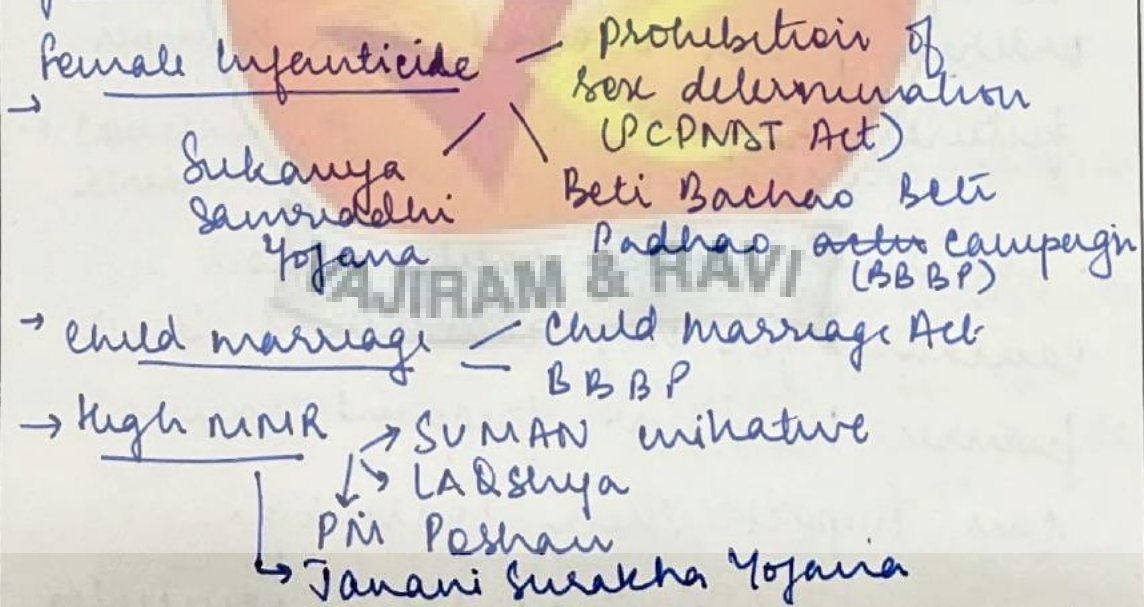
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to reach out to wider audiences.

lastly, as a long term measure, she should have an open discussion with religious leaders & elderly, whereby she must explain how the village is lagging in development. she can use regional ideologies to indoctrinate them with a competitive zeal to do better than other villages. This, coupled with effective implementation of social welfare programs would be a win-win for Rekha.

A civil servant is also a human being first & foremost. Being a parent further increases one's roles & responsibilities. The above case also highlights this aspect and brings to light how personal considerations, can sometimes come in the way of professional duties.

a) Ethical dilemmas involved are:

1. Leading by example as the newly appointed DM. However, the politician's orders, if not obeyed, can hamper future prospects.
2. Ensuring good & continuous education for my children & their future. However, frequent transfers can impact their learning.
3. Adherence to constitutional principles & foundational values of integrity, honesty etc. However, promises for

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better posturing can impair my judgement, thus compromising on objectivity and non-partisanship.

↳ Giving into pressure vs setting the right precedence. It is difficult to follow Nishkam Karma, however, cognitive dissonance due to the ethical dilemmas will make any decision, come at a cost.

⑥ The various options available to me:

Option 1: Accept the offer of politician

Merit

- concern of children addressed
- can complete tenure here
- Better future prospects

Demerit

- compromise on non-partisanship as a value.
- crisis of conscience
- malpractices in elections may invite scrutiny later

Option 2: Reject the offer of the politician & report any electoral malpractices.

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Merits

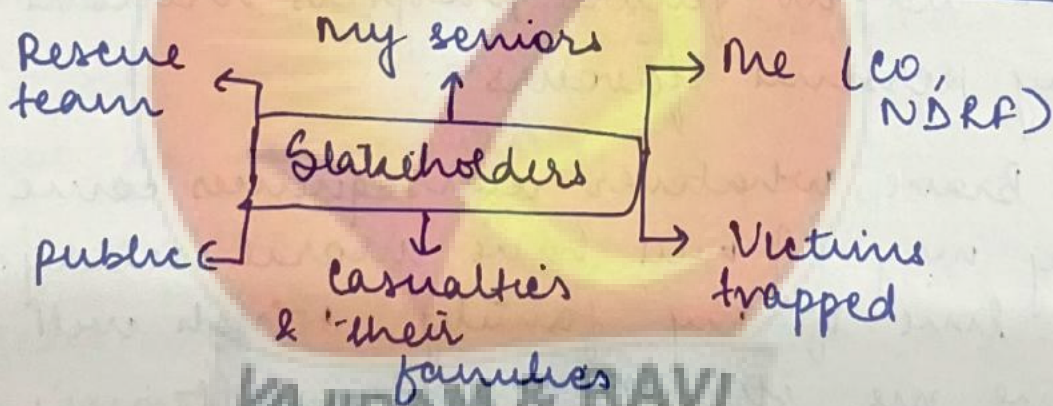
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11) a) Natural and man-made disasters require a multi-pronged strategy of response & rehabilitation. Given the gravity of the situation in the present railway accident, my role as commanding officer of NDRF, would be to ensure speedy rescue & relief to the victims. This shall be followed by ~~routing~~ rehabilitation & mitigation approaches as a long term solution.



a) I would handle the crisis in the following steps:
1. First-things-first: my focus would be on evacuation of those trapped inside. This will also include

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casualties and those severely injured.

2. The ambulances from local staff hospital and para medical staff would be brought to the site for immediate relief, first aid etc.

3. The district authorities will be roped in for providing manpower for relief & rescue operations.

4. The neighbouring districts will be requested to send in adequate quantities of metal cutters, saws etc.

All this can be air-dropped to the site to prevent any delays.

5. Drones can be used to deliver food supplies to the victims so as to help them manage the trauma.

All this while, I shall be physically present at the location so as to boost morale of my team. Further,

I will use Emotional Intelligence



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tools to quell the public anger, by providing timely details of the operation. Further, the railway staff will be roped in for their expertise on railway lines. I will also request the CMO to use ~~his~~ ^{their} social influence & persuasion for crowd management.

(b) Long term steps :

1. Regular visits and inspections to check for any damages in railway tracks.
2. Prepare a dedicated team with training and expertise in handling railway accidents.
3. A detailed SOP ~~is~~ with clearly defined roles and responsibilities for everyone in such crisis management.
4. Dedicated corpus to meet the medical expense of such victims of



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railway accidents.

5. A backup of tools like sawne squad to be positioned at critical locations, especially which are hotspots or multi-junction areas.

6. Inter-departmental coordination between Railways & the Earth sciences to ~~draft~~ modify train schedules based on rainfall warnings.

7. Focus on R&D on drone technology, other modern means of communication during heavy rainfall etc.

Therefore, my approach as CO, NDRF would be to minimise damage and build back better in terms of rehabilitation of victims & increasing operational efficiency of railways to prevent such attacks in future. This requires heading from front. I can take inspiration of IAS officers dealing with Kerala floods to guide me.
